

#### DEEP ROOTS, WIDE SPREAD – A TRIBUTE TO BILL BARRIE

There could be no finer memorial to Almonte resident Bill Barrie than to plant a tree. Bill was a person whose influence spread far and wide, not unlike the canopy of a large tree. A quiet man with a spirited sense of humour, Bill left a lasting legacy for his community.

Bill's military career took him to North Africa, Alaska, Sicily, Italy, India and Europe where he specialized in radar technology. While studying Radio Physics in London he worked on the "Cold War" project to design the Arctic Radar detection system to detect trans-polar Soviet aircraft advancing on North America, later called the Distant Early Warning (DEW) Line.

Retirement for Bill and his wife Betty didn't include a life of indolence. With a lively family, a cottage at White Lake, and myriad interests. Almonte was the richer for Bill's involvement. Besides his membership in the local amateur radio club, he was an active choir member for many years, could play a mean harmonica, loved to crosscountry ski, and was active in a think tank group of colleagues.



He was involved in research projects tracking Canadian military, especially those unsung heroes who were involved in secret work rarely mentioned. He was a contributor to the Pier 21 project in Halifax, and RCAF histories which are on display at the Canadian War Museum. He immersed himself in local projects, including the plan to bring Syrians to the community. Bill could speak several languages, and didn't hesitate to launch into conversation with strangers who warmed to him immediately.

The move to a retirement home offered Bill a new opportunity to share his enthusiasm for life with all who knew him. He was a gracious loving man who rose to the challenges of new adventures, no matter if they were major world-changing or small moments of joy. His sapling tree will grow and flourish like Bill himself to spread its canopy of influence over many generations while it settles deep roots in this community, fortunate to have been Bill and Betty Barrie's home.

The family and all who knew Bill and Betty Barrie are grateful that Orchard View by the Mississippi has seen fit to develop a Memorial Garden to honour beloved local residents.

# Horticultural Therapy

#### Resident of the Month

Doris Scholes was born and grew up in Brantford Ontario, the "summer" home of Alexander Graham Bell. Doris hails from hearty stock, her ancestors were Huguenots, lace makers by trade. Two brothers who emigrated from England were given Crown Land and they settled in the Hamilton area where they started farming.

Doris as a young child during the depression years lived on a farm with her parents and grandparents, and has many fond memories of that time and also when she returned to spend summers after school was out with her grandparents. These were very happy times for Doris; her love of animals and nature in general was formulated and continued to grow during the visits and also in later life.



Doris graduated from High School and left home in 1954. She worked as a bookkeeper in Estate Planning for the Canada Trust Company and later met and married David Scholes. David's career as an Engineer with Bell Telephone took them many places; in fact, as a family they moved 9 times, twice to Montreal. In 1962, during the Kennedy "Camelot" years, Doris and David moved to New Jersey. David was part of a special task force on the development of the "transistor". It was a team comprised of 3 Canadians and one American from each State. In Doris's words, it was an incredible experience meeting people from all over the United States.

Volunteering was always a major part of Doris's life and she sought out areas of interest, and ones that would afford her the opportunity to make a difference in someone's life. She particularly enjoyed working with the Symphony Orchestra and spent 20 years as a volunteer at the Museum of Nature educating students (from kindergarten through to Grade 8) who came to visit the museum. She felt very privileged in this role. One of the many fond memories was the arrival of a group of Vietnamese children who had recently relocated to Ottawa; they couldn't speak any English but there was no problem - they used makeshift sign language and these children were like sponges, able to absorb every detail. Doris said "it was such a rewarding experience".

Doris has an adventuresome spirit, nurtured and supported by her husband David. They travelled all over England, visiting relatives with side trips to Europe. Her zest for new experiences took them to the Arctic via a Russian Research Vessel. They were stranded for two days, surrounded by icebergs in the Arctic waiting for an ice breaker. They also had the opportunity in Nunavut to pay their respects to those who lost their lives in the Franklin expedition, this was a particularly moving and emotional experience. They met many Inuit people during their travels, sampled raw seal, fresh char and absorbed the culture of these very warm and inviting people. Doris has said this was such a wonderful way to see Canada, her love for this country evident on her face.

Doris is very proud of her son Richard and her grandson Ben (who recently joined the Army and is currently in training) and her granddaughter Jane, who is a lawyer. As she reflects on her life, Doris readily says she has had an absolutely wonderful life, "every day has been filled with happiness and joy".
