# Moments that Matter from Residents at OVM Willis Gorley his time with Almonte Distric High School Student

From May through June, Almonte High School Staff chose 16 students from a Civics study class to bond with Residents at Orchard View by the Mississippi. As a part of their curriculum they met with 16 senior volunteers. The volunteers helped and advised the students on their future careers and life styles. Resident retirees reviewed their personal careers and answered students' questions. Some questions asked involved my schooling and subjects from 1941, my war time in the R.C.A.F and overseas and if I had any pictures, post war schooling like, my first job plus my 35 year highlights.

Civics can be classified as a study of people as they relate to particular PLACE at a particular TIME. From their names much can be learned as to where they originated and their group. I realized that after several weeks I knew little about my students life and country. So this becomes a very interesting story.

My student's name was Dante Marulanda. The name "Marulanda" is a well known name in Columbia. It is the name of a village and is a huge land area about an 800 kms distance from the capital of Bogota. It is the surname of my student and a large settlement of their people. Dante's father came to Canada towards the end of the Columbian uprising 40 years ago. Apparently because of previous training in Columbia procured a job in Ottawa involving First Aid and has his own company now. Dante, the oldest of 3, was born in Ottawa and is now 15 years of age. So he proudly declares he is A CANADIAN!

Dante is in grade 10 and his teachers are Mrs. Wilson and Mr. Shepard. I asked about his family's life in Columbia and about the country itself. He said it's very mountainous and Bogota is the capital city. When speaking about the village, the area and it's name he showed a tinge of pride. He said he can trace family connections back to his great, great grandfather. So which came first, the family name or the area name, the Marulanda name?

About 45 years ago, Columbia has an uprising against their alleged corrupt government. It dragged on for some time. General Ferdinand Marulanda, the uncle of my student, led them. I asked Dante what side he was on and he said, "the side of the

good guys!"

My limited knowledge of the country Columbia harbors back to 1935 when we had to know all about the countries around the world and their capitals. It seems the most time Columbia was in the news was the "Blow Gun", warriors in S. Amerida with deadly poison arrowheads. I asked Dante about this and he said, "they use guns now!" We also talked about the national flower of Columbia and think it is the Poppy. The poppy pods are harvested and deported overseas. Many say it is exported as fertilizer.



On June 14, a group of students, friends, parents and teachers enjoyed a lovely lunch in the Bistro at Orchard View by the Mississippi. Fiddle music was a special treat; games and exchange of gifts closed out an exceptional year. And to our fellow Canadians, let's move forward together keeping in mind those legacies left by our pioneers and by those who perished in two great conflicts and passed the torch for us to hold high and keep the faith.



This show has some 45 majestic floral masterpieces with some 5.5 million plants...wow what a feast for the eyes!!


There are also about 210 species and varieties of plants along the 1 kilometer route which should take about 60-90 minutes to walk.

#### Fly Trap DIY: Catching Fruit Flies

Do you have fruit flies hovering over your fruits and vegetables? You can make a fly trap out of a fast food drink cup, a lid, and some regular cola. Fill the cup one quarter full of cola, put on the lid and insert a straw so that it doesn't touch the cola, leaving about 1 inch of the straw extending out of the lid. Set the cup near your fruit. The flies will fly down the straw into the cola but they can't get out. A TIP FOR OUR VEGGIE GARDENS: Don't pick beans when the plants are wet. Rust and other diseases are almost always present when working



around your beans when the foliage is wet is the best way to spread a disease through the entire planting. You should pick the beans when dry.
