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Resident of the Month: Shirley Smaridge

2022 was an especially emotional and busy year for Shirley, besides packing and moving to Orchard View by the Mississippi, here in Almonte.

She loves that Orchard View is like a small community and says the staff have been exceptional in making her feel at home. Shirley enjoys an active lifestyle where people and activities energize her every day. Making new friends and participating in the various programs certainly helps keep her attitude, a positive one. Enjoying a good game of cribbage, she will take on anyone that would like to play. With a strong Catholic faith, Shirley can be found every Sunday morning in the chapel engaged in Rosary and Prayers. She loves the seasonal decorating that goes on as well, most recently evidenced by all the "green" in celebration of St. Patrick's Day.

So, let's get to know Shirley the person who I always see waiting in the wings when one of her family members are coming in for a visit.

Shirley was born and raised in the Centretown area of Ottawa. As an only daughter in a family of four siblings, she looked after two of her younger brothers who were 14 years her junior. Shirley assumes the role of a caring older sister to this day. Shirley's mother was a stay-at-home Mom and her father owned a manufacturing company that made canvas awnings, tarpaulins for embassies and restaurant entrances as well as tents and hammocks.

Shirley's education started at an all-girl school, then on to Notre Dame Convent for high school and, then rounded out her education with graduation from a secretarial program at Willis Business College.

She loved to sing at any opportunity and has a fond childhood memory of singing at the Chateau Laurier Hotel in Ottawa in a recorded radio choir. Many summers were spent at the family cottage in the west end of Ottawa and with her older brother Len near Peterborough.

After graduating from Willis Business College, Shirley went to work as a stenographer for the Department of Immigration. It was here that she met her future husband, Ron Grandmaitre, who was working in the mailroom. Shirley also worked for a time as a secretary to the RCMP.

Ron and Shirley married in 1951 at St. Patrick's Basilica in Ottawa. Continuing to advance their careers in the government, they enjoyed life in their first home – a very small apartment in downtown Ottawa on Cooper Street. A couple of years later baby Linda arrived and Shirley then stayed home to raise Linda. A couple of years later a second daughter arrived on the scene – Jane. Their rental apartment had become much too small for their growing family, so they moved to the west end of Ottawa where they purchased a triplex, living on the main floor and renting out the other two units. With this new location affording them more space, along came daughter #3 - Donna.

In 1961, Ron was transferred with the Federal Government, necessitating a move to Lachine, Quebec. Shortly after, they bought a house in Pierrefonds, Quebec remaining there for the next 16 years. Winters in Quebec were brutal with severe snowstorms which could close roads, schools and shopping centres quite quickly. Summers on the other hand were especially delightful with family camping trips out West, around many Ontario and United States lakes and mountains. Ron made sure that the camping equipment and supplies all had a special place so he designed a box that became the pullout for supplies, cooking and eating. Each daughter had assignments assisting with the set-up or take-down.

Life in Quebec during the 1960s and 1970s was difficult for a bilingual father and English only mother raising three children. These were the trying times of the FLQ (Front de Liberation du Quebec) and the continuous language wars and bomb scares. A mailbox on the edge of their front lawn became a security threat to the family as the FLQ had been planting bombs in various locations across the city and one had been discovered not 5 minutes from their home.

Shirley returned to work part-time once the girls were in school, juggling work with school schedules; to avoid conflict on the buses or in the schoolyard, the

students were either in early morning classes until noon or noon to evening classes. This added extra work for meals and insecurity to an already volatile situation. Shirley being a natural people person fit right in working retail; she also was an Avon representative for a number of those years.

Her giving heart was recognized many times over when she volunteered at the local hospital spending valuable time with children with Downs Syndrome.

In 1975, the family realized another dream with the purchase of a little fishing cottage outside of Perth on the Big Rideau. In 1976, with a transfer back to Ottawa, Ron and Shirley re-purchased their original triplex on Westhill Avenue in the west end of Ottawa, with Shirley rejoining the world of retail part-time at Ogilvy's Department Store in downtown Ottawa.

In 1983, retirement came knocking after a wonderful trip to Hawaii to celebrate their 25th wedding anniversary. Full time life at the lake now became a reality. The cries of loons, spectacular sunrises, hosting friends, skating, sewing, golfing, square dancing – all great fun at the cottage.

After Ron's sudden passing in 1993, the lake became Shirley's seasonal home, but she continued to golf, bowl and have euchre parties.

A year later she married lifelong friend, Eric Smaridge (Buzz). Buzz with Parkinsons, they still enjoyed life's many pleasures – travel, their love of music as well as each other's company. Shirley took on the role of caregiver once again and cared for Buzz at his home as well as at the Peter D. Clarke Long Term Care home in Ottawa until his passing in 2009. Always with a generous giving heart, she continued to volunteer there for some time afterwards.

Life in Perth came to an end when 47 years of memories were carefully sifted through last year, shared and stowed away in the family's hearts in advance of the eventual sale.

Moving to her first apartment in Ottawa, next to the Carlingwood Shopping Centre where she would walk on a daily basis, was next up right after Buzz passed away in 2009. Then the pull to Almonte, and to be closer to Jane and her husband Bob. We're so glad you decided to make that move Shirley and enjoy seeing you each and every day, fully engaged in whatever it is that you are doing.
